Course description:

The course will introduce the theoretical and empirical research experience of anti-Semitism and

xenophobia. On the on hand, anti-Semitism is a unique phenomenon with its own reasons and

peculiarities, on the other hand, it is many times a mere manifestation of wider xenophobic attitudes.

Thus, the course will propose a joint theoretical and empirical framework. First, it will introduce the

theoretical and historical background of anti-Semitism, by reviewing classic works. Second, the course

shall discuss modern anti-Semitism and its manifestations: anti-Semitism in Christian and Muslim

countries will be covered. Third, the course will touch upon the methodological dilemmas of

Anti-Semitism: how can it be measured? By the end of the course, student will need to present their own

empirical case study about anti-Semitism.

Objectives:

To equip students with the necessary theoretical and empirical knowledge to start their own research on

the field of anti-Semitism and prejudice. The main goal is to spark their interest.
