Students in this seminar will study genocidal acts toward specific ethnic groups and compare the context, attributes, and outcomes. The Holocaust, Rwandan, and Cambodian genocides will serve as primary laboratories of study.

- Multiple variables that create a climate for genocide
- "Tipping point" incident or event that tied combustable variables together
- What perpetrators sought to gain
- · Human Casualties
- Political Outcomes
- What become of the victimized culture immediately afterwards? 10 years and 25 years later?
